Mr. Wozniak, My Lucky Charm

It all began when I first met Mr. Wozniak. I was a junior in high school. Preparing for my senior year, I was invited to an event with the City Colleges of Chicago, and Mr. Wozniak was the speaker for the event. All I can remember from the event was that, as a part of the CPFTA (Chicago Police and Firefighter Training Academy), I would be receiving a two scholarships to attend Harold Washington College. Who would have thought that attending this event would change my life forever?

The second time I saw Mr. Wozniak was at HWC, and this time I was student at the college. Anyone who has been to college can attest that the transition from high school to college is not easy. During that time I landed a part time position as an administrative assistant in the Office of International & Non Traditional Programs, assisting several administrators in the office, including Mr. Wozniak. Stressed out by not knowing what to do, I was lost and confused.

Mr. Wozniak heard about my situation and introduced me to Ms. Hedy Cohen and the Roger Bardwell Scholarship Program. I applied and not long after that, I heard from Ms. Cohen that I was accepted. From that moment on, I studied even harder and completed my AA degree in 2003, and transferred to University of Illinois at Chicago.

Ms. Cohen and Bardwell Scholarships continued to help me during the next two and a half years at UIC. I received moral support, motivation and guidance from Ms. Cohen. At the end of 2005, I mentioned to her that I was looking for an internship position to complete my requirements for graduation. She quickly thought of Mr. Wozniak and told me to reach out to him. Sure enough, I did that the very next day and Mr. Wozniak, without hesitation, told me to come into the college

where he introduced me to Mr. John Metoyer and Dr. Keenan Andrews. This led to my professional career. From intern to part time staff, I was then was promoted to Research Associate at HWC. All I could think was that this was great! Every single encounter I had with Mr. Wozniak was great news.

After two years of working at HWC, an opportunity came up. A marketing research company nearby. I wanted to apply, but I had a difficult time telling Mr. Wozniak. For all these years, he had been supporting me and helping me. With my strong sense of loyalty and having such a meaningful job, I was having the toughest time deciding whether to stay with HWC or look for new challenges in life. Then I figured that the people who supported me all these years would always want the best for me. So I went for it and applied for the position. Although I was nervous, I went to Mr. Wozniak. I told him that I was applying for this job and what he said was "That's great Johnny. I knew that this wasn't for you." At that moment, I knew he didn't mean it in a bad way. What he meant was that he knew that I would continue to challenge myself and continue to learn and grow; he was excited for me. In the end of our conversation, Mr. Wozniak said, "Johnny, let me know if I can help with anything" and I replied, "Can I put you down as a reference?" He replied, "Of course." Exactly one week later, the hiring manager at that market research company called Mr. Wozniak. I received a phone call from the company to come in for an interview, and they told me that they were very impressed with my list of references. That led me to where I am today, a Senior Analyst at major market research company.

I just wanted to take this opportunity to and thank Ms. Hedy Cohen, Mr. George Bickford, Mr. John Metoyer, Dr. Keenan Andrews, Mr. Frank Perry, and Mr. Salvador Diaz, all Roger Bardwell Scholar supporters, and a big thanks to Mr. Wozniak, my lucky charm. If it weren't for all of your kindness, support, and mentorship, I would not be where I am today.

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An Attitude to Emulate

John R. Wozniak, as President of HWC, was a friend to me in ways that may seem minor on the scales of relative position or close familiarity – but he nonetheless exuded a positive and at times critical influence on the course of my education at HWC.

The first opportunity I had to know the man beyond a hello in the hallway was at a Bardwell luncheon. John spoke for a few minutes about his memories of Roger: their shared desk at then Circle Campus, their long friendship as fellow educators, and Roger's joking critique of UIC's architecture. The typical image of a college president as someone stern or superior in their bearing could not be more at odds with the warmth and ease John evinced. He left early, running off to other duties before I could talk to him but other occasions revealed the same affable candor I saw at first. One could not imagine John having enemies, or even very harsh critics. He just seems too likable for that.

The one occasion I really needed to rely on his benevolent judgment, he proved himself true, intervening personally to help Club Des Architectes successfully make a trip to Frank Lloyd Wright's Taliesin home. Had he not cared enough to listen to our problem and offer up solutions, my classmates' and my own hopes would have been dashed. But President Wozniak didn't let us down, and we were able make our pilgrimage.

Then of course, how could we architectural students forget the green roof project? John Madsen, Ivan Tejada and Dolores Ochoa helped a revolving crew of architecture students develop a plan for HWC that may soon become a constructed reality. Again, that door would not likely have opened without John Wozniak's trusting and zealous support.

My memories and regard for John's tenure as president might best be summed up by the last paragraph of an open letter I wrote the man himself:

"Let me compliment you yourself, dear John Wozniak, on piloting such a blessed ship, and for keeping your ears and your door open, against all stereotypical expectations of a 'big man upstairs.' I'm fairly ignorant of academic politics, etc., but your friendliness toward students and staff alike, as well as your progressive attitude toward the future of HWC "have earned you high marks with everyone I've heard offer comment on your administration. If I ever find myself in a position of such high trust, yours will be one attitude I will try my best to emulate."

In Gratitude

Back in Maine in the 1950's, I struggled with school starting in kindergarten. I actually had to be coaxed away from my mother's hand by the teacher, Mrs. Osgood, telling me that my dad had designed the classroom just for me. I believed her since he was an architect. I had polio that year, missed a lot of school and felt that I had to catch up ever since.

I decided not to go to college after high school because I had no direction and was just trying to make it through the end of the 60's. At seventeen I left home and got a job as a nurses' aide in Boston. After three years in various jobs, I moved back to an island in Maine and spent ten hard working years as the first lobster woman in the area. I designed a house on that island and built it with my first husband.

When I left the island, I moved to New York City to try to get my life back under control. After a few years I realized that I needed to continue my education and attended Hunter College. I found out that I was smart! I still had a hard time finding the direction to go with my studies though I did try out the teaching program and worked in East Harlem student teaching. I was discouraged with some of the teaching practices and dropped out of that program. Next, I got married, had a baby and dropped out of school. I found it hard to switch my brain between taking care of my baby and studying. I chose to enjoy taking care of my baby and later had a second one.

I met Hedy when I moved to Evanston and she encouraged me to go back to school to continue my studies, as did a number of my friends. She told me about the Bardwell Scholarship Fund and I applied to Northeastern Illinois University. I began writing there and soon dropped out again to confront some life problems. Eventually, I left the Midwest and moved to California to once again be by the ocean.

Searching for the next step in my life, I found my way back to college and completed my bachelor's degree at New College of California. I had amazing professors who encouraged my writing, and I created a chapbook of poems and songs for my degree. I then went on to the graduate program in Creative Inquiry for my Master of Fine Arts. Although New College went under, my program was taken on by California Institute of Integral

Studies, and I graduated from there with a book that I had started back in Illinois. I graduated at sixty, and am now doing a rewrite of my book so that I can get the story published. It is about an island in Maine!

I thank Hedy for believing in me and for her dedication to helping those who need a hand. I remember Roger and feel his light shining on, as each one of us who receive from the Scholarship get to take our next steps and in turn reach out to help others.

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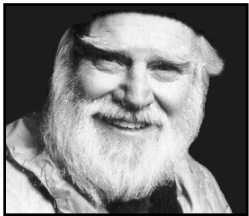
