Bardwell Luncheon: A Smashing Success

Roger Bardwell Scholars held their annual luncheon on Friday, March 20, in the spacious community room on the 11th floor of Harold Washington College. The luncheon provides a yearly opportunity for scholarship donors and HWC faculty to get acquainted with current and former Bardwell Scholars, and to celebrate their collective accomplishments.

Music was provided by RBS Philip Burgess and other members of the Inescapable Mutuality Music Club. Students brought food for a delicious pot-luck buffet, and Kimberly Perez-Lucas sold new Bardwell Scholarship T-shirts and pins to raise funds and awareness for the scholarship. Scholars, faculty and benefactors alike dined at tables decorated with colorful covers, candy and confetti, lending a remarkably festive air to the sun-drenched space on HWC's uppermost floor.

HWC President John R Wozniak gave a brief, informal keynote address, reminiscing about his experiences working with Roger Bardwell at University of Illinois, Chicago, and relaying anecdotes from the late, great educator's life. Wozniak recalled Bardwell's story of a leisurely journey through Europe immediately after World War II, returning an ambulance to the British Army after serving as a medic in Italy. Bardwell opted for the scenic route homeward to Britain, getting a "grand tour" of the post-war continent that no doubt had a great impact on him.

President Wozniak also related the origin of Roger Bardwell's given name. Bardwell's father was so impressed with the educational ethic of a nearby summer camp, that he not only sent his son there – he gave his son the same name as the camp's namesake, Roger. The camp's ethos of building character by trying one's self against nature translated readily to Bardwell's passion for sailing his boat, Raven, on Lake Michigan – an activity Bardwell utilized to impart life lessons to some of the many students he mentored over the years.

Regarding UIC's consciously post-modern architecture, Bardwell once joked to Wozniak that UIC would be better off commissioning "a basic box" than its extant

custom-designed structures, on the premise that people, not buildings, determine the quality of an educational program.

“And Roger was right,” said Wozniak with a grin. “As time has passed, UIC has run into considerable expense with maintenance of those buildings.”

After President Wozniak’s remarks, scholarship administrator Hedy Cohen introduced several key scholarship contributors, all of whom reflected sentiments of happiness and honor at having the chance to participate in Bardwell and Cohen’s ongoing work. Then the Bardwell Scholars each took a turn to stand and introduce themselves to their benefactors.

Several new scholarship recipients were introduced. Previous and continuing recipients checked in as well. All of the scholars present expressed deep gratitude for the efforts of Cohen and the Bardwell contributors. Newcomers who were introduced to just this sampling of Roger Bardwell’s legacy left with an uplifting and lasting impression of the great things people can do when they try to do something good for others.

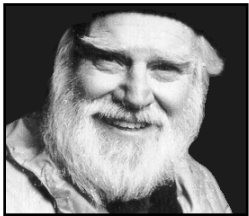
