Traveler for Life is Still Traveling

Several years ago, I started out on the mission of obtaining a college degree. At the time, I didn't have an area of specialty, I just knew I wanted a degree. As I write this story, I have to laugh because I started this journey of seeking higher learning in 1991 and 23 years later I am only half-way towards reaching that goal. Now many might say that is a laughing matter that it took this long just to get this far, but I'm laughing because I was recognized along the way. Life was preparing me for my final destination of graduation. Life doesn't always deal you the perfect hand and you have to play the cards you're dealt. That said, when I was attentive to the cards, I reaped immediate rewards and sometimes claimed double the prize. When I failed to apply a thought process to playing my hand, the results were less planned and desirable.

This failure to focus was compounded by failing to enroll for consecutive semesters or thinking that I could be just as successful even if I delayed my educational goals. The funny thing about success is it sometimes allows you to become too comfortable. Success can make you lax and believe that a degree may not be necessary to accomplish certain feats. During my journey, I put off attending because I was being promoted on my job, was being recruited by state agencies to lead their units and had even created supplemental income through the skills I learned from my job. However, I failed to recognize I was being promoted, because they felt I was enhancing my ability through education. They felt I was investing in myself so they would invest in me. **I attended school without consistency until the agency began to prepare themselves for future projects and I began to get passed over, because to validate their credibility, they sought candidates who had degrees.**

They began to hire and promote individuals who I felt had less knowledge about the agency and were less committed to helping them succeed. This prompted me to refocus my priorities and reestablish the goal of earning a college degree. In 2011, I began to attend Harold Washington College with consistency. It was during this time that I was introduced to the Bardwell Scholars and the infamous Hedy Cohen. She provided me with multiple areas of support and guidance with the focus on accomplishing each stage instead of the entire race. This was until March 2012 when life dealt me another opportunity I was not expecting.

In March 2012, I was given the opportunity to join the Chicago Fire Department. By accepting this challenge, I ventured into a field that required not only rigorous physical training, but the educational aspect of learning to be an Emergency Medical Technician while still enrolled at HWC. I informed Hedy I may have to drop my classes and, as mentioned, she was so supportive. She actually had more safety concerns for me due to the dangers associated with being a fire fighter than I did. Not once did she make me feel that I was abandoning my goal. I renewed my commitment to college despite how difficult it became. That commitment and consistent check-ins from Hedy and my girlfriend, challenging me to do better, contributed to passing both of my courses.

On November 1, 2012, I graduated from the Fire Academy while still continuing my studies at Harold Washington. Although there were some moments that challenged my intellect and ability, I found by taking a deep breath and focusing on the issue, I was able to be successful. On May 3, 2014, I graduated with honors from Harold Washington College. On that day, I, (along with at least 1,800 other City College Students) obtained my Associate's Degree. I have become better at playing the cards dealt and I will fulfill the ultimate goal and graduate with a Bachelor of Science Degree from National Louis University in December 2014. However, none of this would have been attainable without Hedy and the Bardwell Scholarship, and my children, who I leaned on heavily for guidance, along with a strong desire to succeed.

My reason for sharing is to note that we all share some of the same challenges, despite the image we may display. Like myself, many use a good poker face that masks the obstacles. I want everyone to know that when things get stressful, you should turn to your faith, learn to keep your eye on the prize, and persevere. There is a reward waiting for you at the end of the road. That reward is a renewed feeling of self worth and a distinctive piece of paper that says college graduate.




